## **NCDC Projects**

#### **Old Urafirth School**

As we publicised earlier this year, we received phase 1 funding from the Scottish Land Fund to undertake a architectural feasibility study and a housing needs assessment of the whole of Northmavine. Malcolmson's Architect were at the Old Urafirth School last week starting their survey work and we now have the housing needs assessment survey available for anyone in Northmavine to fill in. It would be great to get as many people as possible to take part as it really helps us when applying for funding to have evidence of what the community need is. The Hillswick Shop board would like to thank everyone that took the time to complete the recent customer survey. It was great to get your feedback and there were lots of excellent ideas shared for ways to improve what the shop has to offer. One thing that was highlighted a lot was the shop hours. The shop board did not take the decision to reduce opening hours lightly, but we simply do not have enough staff to cover them all. Members of the shop board and NCDC staff are currently helping to staff both the shop floor and office at present to cover staff shortages and keep the shop open. Unless we can get more staff or people are willing to volunteer to help, it is likely that hours will have to be reduced further.

Both the shop and NCDC boards do not want the shop to close as they recognise what an important asset it is to the community. They are working hard to consider all the options to keep the shop open. NCDC have received three days business support from Just Enterprise to look at the future of shop and the shop board are also working with Business Gateway to create a new business plan.

As much as both boards are working together to safeguard the future of the shop, we need you, the community to continue supporting the shop too. #### **Gardening Jobs**

July is when your hard work starts to bear fruit and there will be lots to start harvesting. You should be checking daily for pests and disease, warm misty days with high humidity can encourage diseases. There is still time to plant salad and radishes for crops over the

summer and it is a great time to think ahead to the winter crops. July is a good time to plant spring cabbages and overwintering onions. If you have a polytunnel or greenhouse late July is a good time to plant spring onions, Palco spinach and Khol rabi for overwintering.

## Joy's Weather Station, Ollaberry

"Whether the weather be Cold, or whether the weather be hot We'll weather the weather, whatever the weather, whether we like it or not."

What month is this?

8 days with extensive mist, with 5 of those days having up to 99% humidity.

May used to be reliably our best month of the year!

Consequently, although we did have 10 days with early sunshine – from 1hr to 4hrs – all before 9am, these did not all hold their promise. We had only 4 days with over 10 hours sunshine – most in a day was on21st with 12.8hr. The overall sunshine for the month of May was 120.4hours, 66% of the 30 year average.

In between all of this we had the proverbial cloud and more cloud, due to being on the northern edge of the high pressure system, pushing up from the south, and bringing down cool breezes from North and East on 14 days.

So the old saying of "Ne'er cast a clout till May is out", has been true this time! I wonder how old that rhyme is!

Anything to cheer us? YES!

It was a dry month with only 44.6mm rainfall. That was 2mm more than last month. So a dry spring. Most rain in one day was 8.7mm on 17th, and 12 days were completely dry.

No gales!

And the lambs are a joy to watch!
