## **Northmavine Beach Cleaning Group**

The Northmavine Beach Cleaning Group went to the West Ayre, Hillswick on Saturday 20th April, 5 bags of bruck was gathered from the beach, a total of 3 bags of fishing gear weighing 15.2kg, and 2 bags of non fishing related litter weighing 8.1kg.

A Scottish Islands Federation Survey was also conducted whilst they cleaned up the beach, over 300 pieces of rope was found, along with lobster tags, oil sample tags, and over 50 shot gun cartridges thought to have come all the way from Canada.

In The Same Boat is Norwegian beach cleaning group funded by the Norwegian Government, by using professional methods combined with mobility and volunteer effort, they want to create a plastic pollution-free world, and a clean and thriving ocean. The group of volunteers have been working hard cleaning up the coast of Norway which is considered to be the 2nd longest coastline in the world. Their organisation has 4 workboats and 3 sail boats allowing them to get to the smaller islands in Norway and 1 expedition boat which has been kitted out to face the extreme weathers of the Artic and the Antarctica. So far in Norway alone they have gathered over 1500 tonnes of litter since

They are on a mission to clean up the beaches and coastlines of the UK, they have sailed across from Norway and come up the east coast of Britain and visited Hillswick on the 25th April, having come up from Westray, Orkney earlier in the week. Jane from the Scottish Islands Federation along with NCDC joined up with them to clean up the remaining part of the West Ayre beach on Thursday afternoon following an informative talk which was held in the Weaving Shed. # Weather Report for February & March from Joy French, Ollaberry

"Whether the weather be Cold, or whether the weather be hot, we'll weather the weather, whatever the weather, whether we like it or not

## **February Weather Report**

The old saying of "February fill-dyke" certainly came true for us this month, as it rained on every day, all 29 of them! It is not surprising that Pressure has been very low, with 18 days below 1000 millibars.

The total rainfall was 176mm (7 inches) while the 30 year average is 137.5mm (5 ½ ins).

The most rain in any day was on 1st with 21.1mm (just short of an inch). A good start!

Not content with that, in the 2nd week we had 6 days with snow lying, up to 10 cm (4 ins), more in some places. Patches of road were blown in, and dug out by local folk, as well as the council gritters.

The wind has played a big part in the month's difficulties. There were 6 official gale days – MET office criteria for a gale day is that the wind must blow for a 10 minute average for at least 39mph, Force 8. Ours lasted longer than that! February left the worst to the last day, when on the 29th the wind blew Force 8 to 10 from the early hours until it eased to F8 in the evening! The maximum gust was 60 mph. Two more days reached 50 mph plus, and 6 more reached 40mph plus.

#### Temperature.

The highest daily temperature was 10.2deg Celsius on 2nd, the lowest -1.7degC, and the lowest grass temperature - 3.8deg C on 7,8th. There were 18 ground frosts.

Temperatures felt much colder with the wind chill, but were actually + 0.4degC above

the average mean at 4.5degC. Sometimes, when the wind direction changed, it was warmer at night than in the daytime!

#### Sunshine.

Listen to this! Sunshine hours were 53.7hr for the month, but 38 of those hours did not come until the last week! The first 3 weeks shared 15.7hrs of sunshine between them.

No wonder we were getting desperate in those dark days!

### **March Weather Report**

Before the more mundane observations for this month, might you have been outside around 9pm or so on Wed. 20th March? Did you see a huge circle of light in the South Western sky, with the large (almost full) moon at its centre? You were watching a 22degree lunar halo. It was the best we have seen since coming to Shetland 21 years ago. The outer circle was complete, and very clear.

Following this on 26th, how about the huge fluffy flake SNOW shower, which surprised us by arriving between 8 and 10 am that morning, covering the ground with 3 inches of lying snow so quickly, and thawing by midday!

Was it anything to do with long 8 hours of sunshine the previous day, (25th), which was the most in any day that month?

## Another surprise!

Rainfall was less than average this month with 105.8mm, just above 4inches, and 88% of 30yr. average. One third fell in the first half of the month, and two thirds in the second half. There were 4 dry days and 7 more below 1mm. There were no extreme amounts on any single day, the highest being 11.2mm on 28th.

Total sunshine hours were very low. In fact, at 63.4 hours, only 61% of average, it was the lowest March figure in my records (21years). This made it a very dark month until the last week, which included 3 days, accruing 17hrs between them!



Winds have continued to be strong, but only 2 actual gale days were recorded, one of which was also the only fog day, but also on other days high winds have caused disruptions in the timetables of ferries, and some flights, with some being cancelled.

The mean temperatures for this month are exactly the same as in March 2010. In both years the mean temperatures were as follows: Mean max 7.8deg C; Mean min 3.7deg C; and overall Mean 5.8deg C. which made a difference of +0.9deg C above the 30 year norm. Even so there were 14 ground frosts during the month, and the lowest temperature at grass level being -5.1degC on 26th.
