This is the time of year to start cutting back your plants/bushes ready for the spring, keep your cuttings and take them to our new composting machine at Bruckland. We have two wooden stores down near the big polycrub where you can leave cuttings. If you need help, please come Monday or Tuesday between 2-5pm.

As we're still prone to the cold temperatures and frost just now, it's best to delay another month and sow seeds in pots, or trays for starting off in the windowsill/airing cupboard.

Get early leeks, aubergines, chillies, celery, celeriac, sown now to make sure they have a long enough growing season. Other vegetables that you can get sowed for planting out in March & April are pak choi, spinach, chard, cabbage, cauliflower and broccoli.

Make sure to continue to ventilate your undercovering growing spaces, even if the temperatures are low or it's snowing outside.

# Weather Report for January 2024 by Joy French, Ollaberry

"Whether the weather be Cold, or whether the weather be hot We'll weather the weather, whatever the weather, whether we like it or not"



Some winter weather to start the New Year! We'll start with wind and snow.

Wind first, when the highest gust of the month was on the last day, 31st and reached 68mph, Storm force 11. The wind blew from the early hours, continuously through the day at Force 8 and more, till it eased in the evening to Force 6 to 7, gusts 8 to 10 – big deal.

There were 5 other days with gusts over 50 mph, plus a further 11 days with gusts over 40mph.(Officially to MET Office standards we had 9 gale days.)

This left a quieter spell ...Yes ... when it snowed from 14th to 20th, and schools closed, and many work places too. Here the accumulative snow reached 24 cm (10 inches), but where it blew in, much more – a job for the diggers.

Now to Sunshine, or absence of sunshine hours. There were 16 totally sunless days, and the remaining number of days reached the total of 13.3 hours (30.2% of 30 year average). Now to a worrying thought. Is this a January trend when looking at the last 4 years?

2023 – 17.17hr: 2022 – 7.6hr: 2021 – normal: 2020 – 13.9hr. Is this telling us something? Hopefully not!

Temperatures. The daily maximum was 10.0deg C on 28th: daily minimum -3.4deg C on 17th: lowest grass -5.8deg C on 16,17th: and overall Mean Temperature was 4.0deg C. (January average = 4.4deg C.)Air frost: 1day. Ground frost: 16days. Again some high temperatures for a 24 hour day were in the night, depending on a change in wind direction!

# **Northmavine Beach Clean Group**

Do you enjoy walking along some of the beautiful beaches here in Northmavine? Would you be interested in joining a beach cleaning group? Northmavine has some of Shetland's best beaches, both sandy and stoney. Shetland's location in the North Sea, doesn't help with the amount of litter and bruck that appears on them, we must keep our beaches clean, for our wildlife and for ourselves.

We have been speaking with the Scottish Island Federation who are keen to get some regular data from Shetland about what types of marine litter are being found on our beaches. You can find out more about the project <u>here</u>.

The Good Food Nation (Scotland) Act passed into law in 2022. Under this new legislation, Scotland will be the first UK nation to have a "National Food Plan".

The Scottish Government published its draft Plan on 24 January 2024. The public consultation process is open and is inviting responses to:

- · the outcomes outlined in the plan;
- its ways of measuring progress (indicators & targets);
- how different groups envision life in a Good Food Nation.
