

20 Questions with Christyne Dunk

1. What made you apply for the job?

I didna apply fur da job Jean Stephen, postmistress at da time n Brian Robertson da postie, towt I might lik tae be da cover fur Brian's holidays, I said I likly cood n Brian said I wis tae go n see Jean. I duly did, signed da Official Secrets Act n da rest is history Dat wis in 1999, I guid full-time in 2004

2. Can you remember your first day?

Yis, Brian picked me up aboot 6.45 da first moarnin, we opened da 4 post boxes on da Ollaberry/Nort Roe run an met da mail van at da Hillsook junction. If I mind right it wis Allan Anderson's last week on da mail van. Back dan we sorted da parcels ida hut at da junction, da letters wir in da mail bags. Da mail wis sorted doon at da Post Office at Sunnyside, Jean med wis coffee n supplied biscuits. We wirkit wir wye nort fae Runnadale tae Isbister, I hed 3 days trainin afore goin solo fur da nixt 3 days, Brian drove da first couple o days, da last day I drove. I wisna much use at reversin n usin da mirrors back dan so Brian wid say "hard ower, hard ower". I'm no bad at it noo.

3. Can you remember your worst day? Was it due to weather?

I'm hed twartree bad days wi wadder. Wan day at da end o Jan 2022 dey wir a lot o wind n we wir telt tae feenish at 12. I hed half a dizen parcels left by 11.45 n decided I wid joost keep goin n git dem delivered I hed wan tae go tae da auld Nort hall. Da door wis kinda tricky n as I wis closin him da handle cam aff in me haand, I guid backwards at a rate o knots til I wis flat on me back n wi dat a car guid by aboot a fit fae me head. I decided tae feenish dan.

4. Is there a particular route, scene, that brings a smile to your face when you're delivering the mail?

I love a bonnie still moarnin at da tail end o da year/or da first o da year, whin da sun is risin whin I hed oot wi da van I also always love comin doon da rod tae Mam n Dad's n da view o Yellsoond in ony wadder.

5. What do you do when you're not delivering the post?

I sweem, I love bein ida sea, I'm a water sign. On Sundays wir group "Da Nort Dunkers" sweem at da Wast Ayre, da Lubba or Sandvoe, dir 20 odd members bit no aabody can win every Sunday I also read a lot n I lik keepin in touch/meetin up wi family n freends.



6. What did you want to be when you grew up?

I wantit tae be a truck driver. Dad used tae drive a truck tae da late Frankie Tait, me n Bert wid go wi him fur da day noo n ageen durin da simmer holidays I niver did onything aboot it tho I guid sooth tae college instead n got an office job.

7. What's your youngest memory?

I can mind bein in da Gilbert Bain tae see me Granny (Dad's Mam) I widda been 3 as sho passed away aboot a fortnight afore I wis 4

8. What would be your desert island book?

9. What is your favourite band/music?

Species On The Edge - contributed

Hello everyone! I'm Gareth the People Engagement Officer for Species on the Edge. We are a new partnership of several conservation charities looking to protect species along the coastlines of Scotland. Here in Shetland, there are eight species we are focussing on: the Whaap (curlew), Peewit (lapwing), Red-Necked Phalarope, Lintie (twite), Shetland Bumblebee, Plantain Leaf Beetle, Endemic Hawkweeds, and the beautiful beach loving Oysterplant.

For both the Hawkweeds and Oysterplant, Northmavine is a crucial site for them in Scotland with beaches like Urafirth

providing homes for some of the healthiest colonies of purple blue flowers. Some of the Hawkweeds are directly named after there namesakes in Northmavine such as the North Roe Hawkweed.

As for the bees and beetles, the Shetland Bumblebee can be found wandering all over, and was spotted multiple times on Species on the Edge's guided beewalk in Ollaberry last month. The Plantain Leaf Beetle is only now known from sites on Unst and Yesnaby in Orkney, but Ronas Hill has been identified as a key site where it could be found! We know very little about both the bee and beetle's populations. Are they doing well? Are they declining?

So what can we do for these species in Northmavine? Maybe come along and lend a hand to plant oysterplants and hawkweeds or volunteer to search for bees by the road or beetles in the hills. Look out for Species on the Edge events to get involved! Have you got any ideas about to help these species? Weather Report for February & March from Joy French, Ollaberry

"Whether the weather be Cold, or whether the weather be hot, we'll weather the weather, whatever the weather, whether we like it or not

May Weather Report 2024

May! What a wonderful month, after our long dark winter, and spring being so slow to get going.

We will begin with the total SUNSHINE hours of 186hrs, which figure has not been reached in any May since 2018, and previous to that, 2012. The highest daily temperature was 19.9 degrees Celsius (about 68C Fahrenheit) on 11th, followed by 19.8C on 17th. There were 16 further days with 15C (60deg F), and obviously some with more! And on 13 of these days there were 3 to 4 hours of sunshine before 9am.

Only on 5th did the TEMPERATURE drop below 10C, which was one of those 3 foggy days, with mist so thick at times that it made driving tricky. There was only 1 Ground Frost when the night sky cleared for a while, dropping the minimum temperature to 3.9C, and the grass temperature to -2.0C. The over-all Mean temperature for May was 11.7C, which was +3.0 degrees C. difference from the 30 year average. All this warmth, coupled with a low average windspeed of 5.7mph, Force 2, for the whole month, has given us a best taste of Summer for a long time.

Even the RAINFALL has taken back-stage, with 25 dry days, only 3days of heavy rain, together yielding 52.6mm of the total rainfall of 58.8mm!

The good weather we have had, no one can take from us!
